An sliabh beannaithe

Is ag bun Chruach Phádraig atá sráidbhaile Mhurasce. Ba anseo a rinneadh ceiliúradh ar chlabhsúr réamh-Chríostaí an fhómhair – Lughnasa.

Ghlac críostaithe seilbh ar ionaid sácráilte cosúil le Cruach Phádraig. I ndiaidh 40 lá a chaitheamh ar mhullach an chnoic sa bhliain 441 AD, deirtear gur chuir Naomh Pádraig an ruaig ar nathracha agus ar dheamhain trí iad a chur amach i dtreo na farraige.

Domhnach na Cruaiche

Is cnoc ard é cruach. Ar an Domhnach deiridh i mí Iúil tugann breis is 25,000 oilithreach aghaidh ar Chruach Pádraig chun meas a léiriú d'earlamh na hÉireann trí aifreann a léamh ar mhullach na cruaiche.

Tugann roinnt oilithreach aghaidh ar an gcruach cosnochta nó ar a lámha agus a nglúine.

Lá an phátrúin

Reáchtáiltear lá pátrúin i Muraisc ag deireadh mhí Lúnasa. I ndiaidh Aifrinne i Mainistir Mhurasce, tiomnaíte do Naomh Pádraig, bíonn ócáid cheiliúrtha ag an bpobal. I measc na n-ócáidí a reáchtáiltear tá ceol, damhsa, sleadóireacht, trialacha madraí caorach agus moltóireacht caorach.

The holy mountain

The village of Murrisk lies at the foot of Croagh Patrick, where the pre-Christian harvest festival of Lughnasa was celebrated.

Christians adopted sacred sites like Croagh Patrick. After fasting on the summit for 40 days in 441 AD, St Patrick is said to have banished snakes and demons by chasing them into the sea.

Reek Sunday

A reek is the Irish name for a high hill. On the last Sunday in July over 25,000 pilgrims climb Croagh Patrick where they honour Ireland’s patron saint by celebrating mass at the summit.

Some pilgrims still climb barefoot or on hands and knees.

Pattern day

Murrisk holds its patron saint’s day in late August. After Mass at Murrisk Abbey, dedicated to St Patrick, the community celebrates with music, dance, turf cutting, sheepdog trials and sheep judging.
