Rásaíocht ar an trá

Is raonta rásaíochta foirfe an gaineamh crua atá le fáil in iarthar na hÉireann.

Tá an-tóir ar rásaíocht chapall ar an trá le breis is leathchéad bliain anuas. Is deis atá ann d'fheirmeoirí áitiúla cumas na gcapaillíní Chonamara agus na gcapall oibre a thástáil. Tá idir 10–12 imeacht luaite ar an gclár rásaí reatha, imeachtaí atá dírithe ar chapaill folaíochta agus capaillíní atá á gcoinneáil san áit.

Bhíodh rásaí á reáchtáil ar roinnt tránna éagsúla i ndeisceart Mhaigh Eo sna blianta sular cinneadh na rásaí a reáchtáil ag Ceathrú an Uisce uaidh sin amach. Thug na sluaite aghaidh ar na rásaí iad réidh le geallta a chur ar na capaill ab ansa leo, agus taitneamh a bhaint as an dearbaí asail agus an tarraingt téide.

Cailín Chluain Cearbán

Racing on the beach

Races were held on several south Mayo beaches over the years before finding a home at Carrownisky. They attracted crowds ready to place bets on their favourite horses and to join in the fun of the donkey derby and the tug of war.
