

The world's most powerful lighthouse

In 1878 the beam from the nearby Galley Head lighthouse could be seen 30 km (19 miles) away. Its unusually powerful light was due to using gas made from cannel coal which burns with a very bright flame.

Some landward window panes had clear glass rather than being blanked out as was the normal custom. According to local tradition Lord Carbery invited a Turkish Sultan to stay in nearby Castle Freke to encourage him to invest in the West Cork Railway. The Sultan wanted to see the light flash from his bedroom.

After the light was converted to electricity in 1969, the clear panes were painted out as the light was a hazard to motorists. Local people missed the light and it was readjusted to shine at a lower strength.
